PROJECT 21 @ UE

We have been talking about Project21 for some time now, and been busy fundraising. Who can remember the quiz night back in October 2019, our first event? (Forever etched in my memory as the night I felt a bit under the weather not realizing the backache was my appendix getting ready to burst).

Obviously, things became more complex with lockdowns and life in general knocked sideways but despite this UE have raised the ballpark figure, the necessary consents and Capital Contribution Addendums finally signed off. Hooray. The plus side of being an LEP is both denominations have given grants, the downside is both denominations need to be consulted and sign off on such a big project so the administration takes longer.

So, we are just about ready to go! A brandnew commercial standard kitchen - so we can share meals through social-eating projects and partners. Specifically, we are looking for supplementing the work of Mosaic with the provision of a once-a-week evening meal, and offering space to support groups such as Dementia Friendly Café or carers groups, as well as "church family meals" where we can share fellowship over are deemed to food. Churches "commercial" premises and so we have to abide by quite strict hygiene rules (think "scores on the doors").

We also plan better access for those with disabilities with a new lift rather than the ski-

slope into the hall so we should also comply with the Equality Act (2010). Alongside this will be a general spruce up, and work to bring us up to date with modern-day regulations.

We thank everyone for their hard work in fundraising and ancillary work already undertaken to brighten up the hall e.g. the work on the stage, dismantling an old office, etc etc. UE look forward to inviting friends from the group and the Circuit to events in the not-too-distant future!

LIVE STREAMED WORSHIP

In the wake of the Covid Pandemic, causing churches to have to rethink how they met for worship and exploring new ways of meeting. Many churches went online and have, since then, continued to live-stream worship.

Over the past few months United have been experimenting with live streaming our morning services via YouTube; initially to a small group of volunteers who have been watching and giving feedback to refine how we work.

In February we were able to extend the livestream link to include all church members and friends on our contact list. It is our intention, as soon as we have worked through this next phase to make the link to our YouTube channel available publicly via our website, news sheets and this quarterly magazine. This is part of our broadening mission to the local community especially with those who are unable to attend church in person.

GETTING OUR ACTS TOGETHER

Acts was written by the same author as the Gospel of Luke. Both are addressed to the same, original reader, Theophilus, to whom Luke wrote to lay down the key truths of the Gospel in an orderly account. It contains many significant moments, beginning with a retelling of the Ascension account and swiftly moves on to the "birthday" of the Church at Pentecost.

Acts focusses on some of the joys and concerns of the first Christians as they began to spread the Good News, encountering opposition from outside and disagreement within their own numbers. It serves to encourage and inspire us in our service and life together as part of the Church today.

From Easter and in the following weeks, Helen has invited those preaching at United Emmanuel to engage with various passages from Acts, highlighted by the lectionary at this time of year. These are as follows:

If you visit Rusthall URC you will notice that an attractive framed picture has been hung in the entrance area. It has been presented to the church by Karen Gardner, a regular at our Pins and Needles Group and comes from her late father's art collection. It is a lithographic print of a painting by Russian Born French artist Marc Chagall, entitled "Bouquet De Fleur et Amants".

It's hard to appreciate the detail and most certainly the colour of the image from this tiny grayscale image. After the initial splash of colour in the bouquet, you will see a couple, possibly a bride and groom embracing, the moon born by a horse, which may represent the night sky, a party of musicians and others, maybe wedding guests, a table laid for a meal and even a small bird swooping into the top left corner.

Chagall is perhaps best known, in our region, for his work in creating the stained-glass windows at All Saints Church in Tudely, Kent. Chagall was Jewish but often included Christ and other powerful Christian imagery in his work.

MOTHERING SUNDAY



The fourth Sunday of Lent (27th March this year) has for centuries been celebrated as Mothering Sunday. It is also

known as Refreshment Sunday when flowers were permitted to be displayed in church, otherwise forbidden in Lent.

On Mothering Sunday, Christians have historically visited their mother church - the church in which they were baptised. As these churches were often situated in the village where family lived, the day would also be an opportunity to visit Mum and take her a gift.

For many Mothering Sunday (aka Mother's Day in the UK) is a day of joy and marked by visits to our mothers, maybe a meal together with cards and gifts exchanged. However, for some it is a day with far more difficult associations. Some may have (or have had) very difficult relationships with their mothers, some may not have known their

birth mothers. Some may have longed to be a mother but been unable. Some may be mourning the loss of their mother or of a child. As we gather to mark this day we must be conscious of those for whom the day will be tough.

We must also remember, not just our mothers but those who have been like a mother to us – this can include adoptive or foster parents, relatives, friends, fellow Christians, men as well as women. These to should give us pause to give thanks.

Of course, in all this, as God's people we are called to remember our heavenly parent, Father (and Mother) God. It may seem strange to call God our mother; God is neither male nor female (although we have traditionally used male titles and pronouns) and the loving care of God is mirrored as much by human mothers as by fathers and in many ways more so.

Let us then, on Mothering Sunday, give praise to God, remembering with thanksgiving our mothers and those who have been like a mother to us. Let us pray for and with those for whom the associations of the day may be challenging. Let us remember that we are deeply and unendingly loved by God, each made in God's image and called to be a child of God.

A POINT TO PONDER

About three years ago the B.B.C. ran a series during Holy week where a well-known artist moved around Jerusalem sketching the various scenes which are mentioned in the Bible. It impressed me, for it took me to these places and inhabited them with actual

people that the artist brought alive by the commentary that he gave as he worked.

It also reminded me of a problem that we can all have in separating what we read and see on television from what actually happens. I was surprised to realise, when in Africa, that our Malawian Science Teacher thought that every person who died in the films that we viewed regularly was not acting but actually died. If a well-educated and intelligent person like George could be taken in, how must our children get mixed messages from the colourful fast-moving diet of images presented to them in words and pictures.

What we read in our Bibles was recorded by people who did not want the knowledge of what had actually happened to be lost. It was written after, but the places and incidents were real. These were not imagined. It must be very easy for our young people (and even ourselves) to discard what has been written and not to accept this recording of two thousand years ago in a simpler world.

As Easter comes let us take time to relive those memorable days and to share them with each other and with the next generation. These are not just stories but actual events, in actual places that we call to mind.

EASTER TRADITIONS

Nobody seems to know exactly why we give the festival the name Easter. In the majority of other European languages, the word is a variation Passover (Pesach). It most likely comes from the Anglo-Saxon name for the month of April, 'Eostremonath'. Some have suggested this month takes its name from a German goddess, Eostre, who is also associated, in legend, with the Easter Bunny.

Hot Cross Buns

This delicious treat, usually associated with Good Friday, with the cross



marking a clear reminder of the day's events, may have originated in St Albans. However, this suggestion seems to have originated from an advertisement used by a London Baker to increase sales of the product. Variations on the original are now available including chocolate orange flavoured; M&S have cheese and even Marmite hot cross buns in their range.

Easter Blooms

White lilies are the classic flower associated with Easter. There colour is a symbol of purity and serves as a reminder of the purity and holiness of Jesus, the perfect one who died on the cross.



There's also the passion flower, rich with symbolism, that have been interpreted in many different ways of the years. The three stamens

may represent the nails in Christ's hands and feet, the Holy Trinity or the three crosses on calvary – Jesus was crucified between two thieves. (See Luke 23:39-43) The circle of petals may be said to represent the crown of thorns placed on the head of Jesus. The leaves are said to represent the spear with which the side of Jesus was pierced. The Passion flower usually lasts for three days – a reminder perhaps of the three days from Good Friday to Resurrection Sunday.



UNITED REFORMED CHURCH NEWS

WEST KENT & EAST SUSSEX SYNOD AREA

Representatives of the 22 United Reformed Churches that make up the West Kent and East Sussex Synod Area (WKESSA) met at Maidstone URC and via Zoom on Sunday 13th February.

Wonderful Local Church Leaders: Since the 1980s some churches in the WKESSA area have been led by what are now called Local Church Leaders: trained, lay volunteers who can be embedded in the local church and community. Membership trends in the churches they lead have been better than the average for the URC.

We were glad to applaud Pam Tolhurst, our long serving LCL at Balmoral Road, Gillingham, following her award of the British Empire Medal in the New Year Honours for her contribution to the community through her church service.

Also receiving national recognition have been Peter and Marie Jackson, LCLs who lead Sedlescombe Chapel. A double page colour spread in the URC magazine *Reform* outlined the transformation they have achieved since hearing a Call to the village in 2015.

Treasuring our Ministers: While the number of LCLs has been growing the number of Ministers of Word and Sacraments has been shrinking, making it ever more important to ensure they are used creatively in settings where their training and gifts can make the greatest positive difference.

The Revd Helen Warmington, the Convenor of the Synod Deployment Group, updated us on the latest work on ministerial deployment principles and processes. Several contributors to our discussion stressed the need to avoid expecting one minister to give day to day leadership to many churches; in most places the Elders would be the key visible leaders.

Old and New Chapters: We learnt with sadness that St Paul's URC in Gravesend has not felt able to reopen after the lockdowns and the existing chapter of its life has come to an end. The Revd Dr George Kalu is leading an initiative to explore the possibility of a new team to start fresh work on the site and prayers and volunteers for this are sought.

One of the people involved in exploring Gravesend options has been the Revd Wendy Swan, in her new role as Synod Director of Mission Projects. She explained how she can help in places where the energy for existing patterns of being the Church has run out.





Faith - Hope - Love - Since 1972

In October 1972 the United Reformed Church was established. This key moment marked the

uniting of the Congregational Church in England and Wales and the Presbyterian Church in England. In 1981 the Re-formed Association of the Churches of Christ was added to the family. In 2000 the Congregational Church of Scotland also joined.

This year marks the 50th Anniversary of the United Reformed Church – a Jubilee year and a time to celebrate, reflect, look back with thanksgiving and look forward with hope in God's plan and promises.

The URC has been a catalyst encouraging different churches to work more closely together locally, nationally and internationally. We see much greater sharing and willingness to work together. In our own group of churches this is particularly marked by the established of United Emmanuel Church – the coming together of Tunbridge Wells URC and Vale Royal Methodist Churches to form one church.

Later in the year we plan to mark this milestone with events such as themed worship, special services and community celebrations. If you would like to help plan and organise these in our three churches, or have any ideas about how we could celebrate with the wider community please contact our Minister, Rev Helen Warmington.

TRAINING TO BE A URC ASSEMBLY ACCREDITED LAY PREACHER



Calling all those leading worship in our local churches and wishing to learn and grow as a Lay Preacher.

The next course to train to become an Assembly Accredited Lay Preacher begins in September 2022. This is a two-year parttime course leading Assembly to Accreditation. Learning is by mixed mode with some sessions on Zoom, some prerecorded, and work to be done in between; there are also 2 study weekends a year. The programme covers personal development, crafting worship, the Bible in worship, theology of the URC, safe boundaries in pastoral care, equality and diversity and intergenerational worship.

CALL TO SERVE

Methodist Army Chaplains Take the Lead

In May 2022, the Rev Michael D. Parker will take up his new role as the 26th Chaplain General of her Majesty's Land Forces. Mike Parker was born in



Cornwall and initially trained as an electrical engineer for the Ministry of Defence. He read Theology at the University of Birmingham and trained for Methodist ministry at Queen's College (now The Queen's Foundation). He worked in the Colchester Circuit for four years and was commissioned into the Royal Army Chaplains' Department in 2000.

Operational service has taken him to Northern Ireland, Iraq and Afghanistan and he has, since September 2020, been the Deputy Chaplain General for the army.

Padre Parker said: "It is the greatest of honours to have been selected as the next Chaplain General for Her Majesty's Land Forces. Methodism has a long and treasured history of providing soldiers and chaplains in service of their country, that they do so explicitly as people of faith continues to make the organisation a better place to be.

Since the Methodist Church first stationed me to serve alongside the military community, I have had the privilege of offering pastoral care, spiritual support and moral guidance, around the globe in good times and bad. I have witnessed the joy of new found faith and the renewal brought by Methodist brothers and sisters from distant shores. Throughout, the words of Charles Wesley have been a constant – Jesus, confirm my heart's desire to work, and speak, and think for thee; still let me guard the holy fire, and still stir up thy gift in me."

With Michael Parker moving into the senior role, a replacement for his previous post was needed. In December it was announced that

Methodist Minister, the Rev David Barrett will take over as the Deputy Chaplain General in the Royal Army Chaplains' Department. It will mean that for the first time,



Methodist Ministers will occupy the two most senior chaplaincy positions in the British Army.

David is originally from Blackpool in Lancashire and trained be a Methodist minister at Wesley College in Bristol before he was ordained in 1992. Following circuit appointments in Kent he joined the Royal Army Chaplains' Department in 1999 and served as a regimental chaplain in both the United Kingdom and Germany, before becoming Senior Chaplain in 2012. Most recently David was appointed Assistant Chaplain General to the 1st (United Kingdom) Division in York in January 2019 and in November 2021 became Assistant Chaplain General, Regional Command, based in Aldershot. During his time in the Army, he has been deployed on operations to the Balkans, Iraq and Afghanistan. Since 2011 he has been a member of the Methodist Forces Board and the Denominational Representative Chaplain to the Army for the Methodist Church.



GOD'S CHURCH A home for all: walk

Daud Irfan, Methodist Youth President 2021/2022, accompanied by the Revd Irfan John, his father and the Wales Synod Enabler for Culturally Diverse Congregations, are to walk from their home circuit in Cardiff to Wesley's Chapel in London, raising awareness of the need for more diverse leadership in the Church.

They are calling on young people, especially those from culturally diverse backgrounds, to join the walk, realise their leadership potential, and for churches and circuits to raise up their young leaders.

After a service of celebration, the walk sets off from Rumney Methodist Church, Cardiff on Sunday 27 February. As the pair walk the 160 miles to London, they will be stopping at various churches along the way, arriving at Wesley's Chapel in City Road on Saturday 5 March where a service attended

by leading Methodists will welcome the walkers.

Daud commented, "As we look to encourage Black British, British Asian and global diaspora leadership through this walk, I hope that others will join me along the route and that local churches will open their doors and host events relating to my theme and purpose. Though the UK is becoming more ethnically and culturally diverse, this representation is still not often seen within the Church."

Doesn't time fly when you are enjoying yourself! Having joined the pastorate for my final placement back in September 2022, it's hard to believe that I have just under 14 weeks left. It has been a really engaging placement with a fantastic role model and guide in Rev Helen.

Last Summer I was asked to write a personnel profile, outlining some of my understanding, experience and hopes for future ministry. The details of all the student ministers were viewed by the URC Synod Moderators' Meeting and held alongside the profiles of the pastorates in which a vacancy had been declared. It's a bit like a sort of "dating agency".

A pastorate was identified which the moderators felt was one which would be a good match for me. There followed by a formal "introduction" and interviews. I was next invited "Preach with a view". On Sunday 28th November I lead two services. The morning service was "live-streamed" and shared by four of the churches some in person and some watching in their own church buildings. Leiston United (LEP)




Felixstowe URC
