"Now learn this lesson from the fig tree: As soon as its twigs get tender and its leaves come out, you know that summer is near."

Mark 13:28

Suzanne shared a wonderful story about a small boy who had invested great time and

effort in building a model boat. When complete he took the boat to sail it on a local pond and, to his horror, he let go of the string and the yacht was lost.

Days later, passing a toy shop in the town, he saw his yacht in the window. The boy darted in and told the shopkeeper that it was his yacht. He was saddened to be told, "It's mine now, if you want it, you'll have to pay for it."

Returning home, the boy told his father about what had happened. "How much will it cost?" asked his dad. "I don't know." replied the boy sadly. "How much have you got?" responded the father.

The boy rushed to empty his piggy bank, searched pockets and down the back of the sofa to gather every penny he had. Without hesitation he returned to the shop. Placed the money on the counter and left with the boat with saying a word. Back at home he showed his father the boat and explained, "It is doubly mine, I made it and then I bought it!"

The story served as an allegory of God's love for us - we are doubly loved - God made us and paid the price to redeem us. God's love is amazing.

Tea, coffee and biscuits followed with a time to catch up with the others attending. Our group then gathered again in the chapel to share a time of reflection with Suzanne. Our focus was this passage:

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." Matthew 11:28-30



Suzanne concluded the session with a story by Max Lucado entitled "You are Special". A poignant quote from this, the words of the wood carver creator,



AN ENTERTAINING AFTERNOON ST GEORGE'S DAY



On Saturday 23rd April, over 60 folk gathered in the church to enjoy an afternoon of entertainment and a delicious cream tea.

The programme began with a short film celebrating St George and dispelling some of the myths that surround him. Born in Cappadocia in modern day Turkey (although that fact is disputed by some), a Roman centurion who never visited England or fought a dragon, St George is celebrated in many parts of the world.

We were then taken on a journey of music, song, poetry and comedy which included an "Ode to St George" read by Rev Helen

dedicated to the memory of Malcolm Brown. Helen had met with Malcolm prior to his passing and he had asked her to read the poem on his behalf.

We heard folk songs, comedy songs by such writers as Joyce Grenfell, Flanders & Swan and Jeremy Lloyd. There was a monologue or two and sketches written by Adrian Plass, Stephen Fry & High Laurie. Music for recorder and piano duet and much more.

During the interval we tucked into scones with jam and clotted cream (there were also some "specially targeted" cheese scones). There was plenty of tea to quench our thirsts.

The concert was planned to raise further funding for Project 21. We are delighted to report that, after deduction of costs for the cream tea (clotted cream does not come cheap) we added £350 to the fund.

A huge thankyou to everyone who took part in the concert and those who prepared and served the tea. It was a thoroughly entertaining and enjoyable way to raise much needed finance towards the cost of the redevelopment of the hall and kitchen.

PROJECT 21 UPDATE



Things have been progressing well with the redevelopment project. The heavy "engineering" to enable the

pillar in the middle of the kitchen to be removed and replaced by some enormous steelwork is complete. Underfloor work in the kitchen carried out. The new heating and boiler for the hall installed. The hatchway and door from the hall to the kitchen has been enlarged and the huge extractor hood is in place.

At present the redecoration of the whole space is underway, a mammoth task, and things are starting to look clean and fresh. Neutral colours are replacing the former salmon pink and yellow combination giving a more modern feel.

Unsurprisingly, given the current financial climate, there have been some increases in costs so we will continue to seek to raise funds until the Autumn. Some important elements, such as the accessibility lift, had increased in price since the original quotation.

The project is well on track to be finished on time, by the end of June. We already have a booking for early July which will make use of the refreshed hall space and the high spec commercial kitchen.

As the project comes to completion and we realise the full potential of the facilities we will together, as a church, seek to maximise the use of the space. This is part of our missional activity and a significant opportunity to offer social eating and hospitality, and exploring new ways to reach out in the name of Jesus Christ.

GOING LIVE

In the last edition of Crossover Quarterly, we mentioned our aim to go fully public with our live-streaming project. Just before Easter this ambition was realised. Our first fully public live stream was on Palm Sunday, a service led by Rev Helen.

We were greatly blessed to receive a grant, from the Southern Synod Strategic Mission Fund, towards the cost of the necessary items and resources to enable us to reach

this point together with several generous donations of equipment. Special thanks go to Dave Jesse, Adam Earle, Eric Christian, Adrian McGlynn and Jane McGlynn.

If you would be interested in joining the team operating the livestream then please have a word with Dave Jesse. Training will be available as needed.



Shortly we hope to be able to allow members and friends worshipping at home to bring readings or lead prayers as part of our worship.

WARM AT LAST! CHURCH HEATING



After several months of research, negotiation and decision making we are pleased to say that the project to replace the failed gas heater, which provides warm air to heat the main worship area, is coming to a conclusion. In the end the only viable solution

proved to be replacing the failed heater with a new one.

Ensuring that the new system is compliant with all the necessary regulations and

standards meant the installation of a new flue lining to the chimney and some additional duct work to provide ventilation to the heater room. It is somewhat ironic that the heating will be up and running just in time for the Summer when we don't require it. However, we can be confident that, when the colder days return, we will be warm as we gather for worship.

Whilst the replacement system was expensive (although less than some of the alternatives considered) we are delighted to report that our bid to the URC Southern Synod Building Fund was successful. They have generously agreed to pay for 50% of the total cost.

SUNFLOWER CLUB WELCOMING UKRAINIAN GUESTS



If you have been in or near United Emmanuel Church in recent weeks you will no doubt have seen the large welcome banner on the front of "Church House" and the

Sunflowers displayed in the window. Rev Helen was moved by the ongoing war in Ukraine, and the arrival of an increasing number of Ukrainian guests in the Tunbridge Wells area, to provide a meeting space for them and their host sponsors — so the Sunflower Club was born.

Beginning on the Sunday 10th April, every Sunday afternoon from 3:00pm to 5:00pm, we have opened the church to offer a meeting space, with refreshments and other resources, for Ukrainian Guests and their sponsoring families. From small beginnings

the number attending has grown and it is, at present, a thriving group.

Dear Lulu,

"Dear Lulu, Nobody invented me - but lots of people discovered me and were quite surprised. When they looked round at the world and thought it was really beautiful or really mysterious and wondered where it came from. They discovered me when they were very very quiet on their own and felt a sort of peace and love they hadn't expected.

Then they invented ideas about me - some of them sensible and some of them not very sensible. From time to time I sent them some hints - especially in the life of Jesus - to help them get closer to what I'm really like.

But there was nothing and nobody around before me to invent me. Rather like somebody who writes a story in a book, I started making up the story of the world and eventually invented human beings like you who could ask me awkward questions!"

And then he'd send you lots of love and sign off. I know he doesn't usually write letters, so

I have to do the best I can on his behalf. Lots of love from me too.

PENTECOST, TRINITY SUNDAY & ORDINARY TIME

PENTECOST

This year Sunday 5th June brings to an end the season of Easter with the Day of Pentecost. It is the 50th day



after Easter Sunday when the Church celebrates the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

The apostles were gathered in one place when the room was filled with sound like the blowing of a violent wind and tongues of flame were seen to touch each one on the head. The Holy Spirit filled them and they began to speak in other languages. This meant that all those gathered in Jerusalem to celebrate the Jewish festival of Shavuot, the Feast of Weeks, were able to hear and understand the good news.

These events fulfilled the prophecy of Joel - 'In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all people.' Previously God's Spirit may have come to rest on individuals, for a time, and may have been withdrawn. Now the Spirit was poured out on all God's people and permanent dwelling of God with humanity made possible through the work of Jesus.

Pentecost is sometimes called the "Birthday of the Church". From this moment the rate at which the faith spread increased dramatically. Why not revisit the story and explore it further in Acts chapter 2.

TRINITY SUNDAY

Sunday 12th June will be Trinity Sunday, an unusual festival in the Christian calendar in that



it does not celebrate a particular event in the life of Christ or the Church. Instead, it draws our attention to a doctrine, a theological understanding of God.

We don't find the word Trinity in the Bible but we do find passages and references to the three persons of the Trinity – Father, Son and Holy Spirit. People have encountered God in these three distinct persons but also recognised that there is only one God.

We might try and draw analogies between the Trinity and things we find in nature such as St Patrick's famous shamrock, an egg (yolk, white and shell), Water (liquid, solid and gas) or even the Sun but none of these reveal the fulness of the idea or the nature of God. We usually then resort to either avoiding the subject, inviting someone else to preach on that Sunday or invoke the "mystery of God".

Perhaps "mystery" is the right way ahead as the human mind, however sophisticated and advanced, does not have the capacity to grasp the fullness and reality of God. What the idea of Trinity affirms is that God is one being with three persons — all at once God and yet all at once distinct.

What matters is, at the heart of God is a perfect, balanced, unbreakable loving relationship. When we read that "God is love" we can then understand that love is at the heart of God. The wonderful thing is that through Christ we are invited into this relationship, this perfect love. In Christ we are embraced in God.

ORDINARY TIME

From Trinity Sunday onwards we enter what is traditionally known as



"Ordinary Time" in the Christian calendar. We might think that the name stems from distinctive lack of festivals celebrations especially during the Summer months. It's not until the autumn that we with pick the Harvest Festival. uр Creationtide and the Season of Remembrance.

The colour associated with ordinary time is mint green. Although in our traditions we don't really follow the liturgical colours it might be worth taking some time, over the Summer months, to reflect on the many things that we associate with the colour green.

Here's a possible thought chain to get you started: Ordinary has its roots in the word "order" \rightarrow In creation God brings order out of chaos \rightarrow Green is the colour of creation \rightarrow Ordinary time could be a time to reflect on creation and protecting the environment or maybe (just maybe) getting the gardening up to date!

I'll leave it with you to come up with your own thoughts but remember that where God is present nothing is ordinary - we have an extraordinary God. How will God fit in to your ordinary time this summer?





PLATINUM JUBILEE OF HER MAJESTY QUEEN ELIZABETH II


God of Creation, designer of sameness and diversity, of time and eternity, we give you thanks and praise.

Southern Synod) will be preaching and Rev Helen will be leading the intercessions.

The space at the church is limited to about 100 people and I already have about 30 names on my list. The majority of places are allocated by invitation to members of the receiving pastorate. However, the service will be live streamed and, nearer the time, I will share the link to be circulated so friends of the Tunbridge Wells Group will be able to join to watch.

We are in the process of organising telephone providers and internet access which will include a new email address and phone numbers which I will share with Rev Helen, Richard and others as soon as I have these confirmed. I will be getting some business cards printed as well which will be quite exciting in many ways — a landmark on the journey.


